Thank you to the 25 volunteers who made the anniversary a success.










Recipe for Minnesota Wild Rice Hot dish

1# Minnesota wild rice (accept no substitutes!)

2# ground beef

2 cups diced celery

Salt

1-2 cups diced onion

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can cream of chicken soup

2 4oz. cans of mushrooms (drained) ½ cup soy sauce ½ cup slivered almonds

Wild rice cooking method:

Wash the wild rice thoroughly by running cold water over wild rice in a fine strainer. Bring 3 cups of water for each cup of wild rice to a boil. Add a pinch of salt and the wild rice. Reduce heat and simmer covered for 35-50 minutes or just until the kernels puff open. Fluff with a fork and drain off the water. Rinse thoroughly in a strainer with hot water. For chewier texture, cook less time.

Brown the ground beef and set aside. Sauté the celery and onions in butter or margarine in a separate pan for 5-10 minutes or until tender.

Combine the ground beef, wild rice, sautéed celery and onions, mushrooms, soups, soy sauce, and almonds and stir until mixed. Place the mixture in a slightly buttered 3 quart casserole. Bake at 350° for an hour, stirring occasionally. Add water if needed.

The children will sing a few songs, then we will open up the preschool and fellowship rooms and have stations available for games, crafts, refreshments, etc. It is our hope that this will offer families and guests a chance to visit and interact with their children in the midst of this busy season. The party will be on Thursday, December 21 from 6:00 – 7:30. We hope to celebrate with you!

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PASTOR'S MESSAGE

It is that time of the year again when some Christians make a fuss about the commercialization of Christmas. Other Christians talk about how the world is trying to take the Christ out of Christmas. Good arguments can be made for both of those statements. Regardless, our Christmas today certainly doesn't reflect the first Christmas.

Christmas began as a very humble event, an event that exhibited the greatest humility the world has ever seen—the God of glory being laid in a manger – a feeding trough.

Humility was exhibited in Mary's situation. Everything about Mary was humble—her hometown, her poverty, her hardships, her displacement in Bethlehem, her setting.

Humility was expressed in Mary's song. In her Magnificat, she spoke of how God resists the proud but exalts the lowly.

Humility exemplified in Mary's Son. Jesus was the Son of God who became the Son of Man.

We take pride in birth and rank, but He was a carpenter's son. We take pride in possessions, but He had nowhere to lay His head. Is there any way in which we can observe Christmas with the personal humility that reflects our Savior? God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble.

We can look back to the first Christmas to gain insight on how we as twenty-first-century believers can and should celebrate Christmas.

We celebrate Christmas by telling others about Christ. Luke 2:17 says: "When they had seen Him, they made widely known the saying which was told them concerning this Child."

We celebrate Christmas by reflecting on its wonderful meaning. Luke 2:18 and 19 tell us that everyone who heard about the birth of Christ marveled, and Mary pondered these things in her heart.

We celebrate Christmas by offering praise and glory to God. Luke 2:20 tells us the shepherds glorified and praised God for all they had heard and seen.

Put Christ back into your Christmas. Tell others about Him and invite them to our church on Christmas Eve at 4PM. Make time to ponder Him in your heart, and take every opportunity of praising the Christ of Bethlehem.
