
At the Church, I will normally eat my Sunday noon meal, unless I am invited to your homes. I bring my own food, and I drink pure water, without ice.

Tips in Extending an Invitation to Church

Rev Natske on March 3 talked about inviting people to church during his sermon at Redeemer. There are 76 million unchurched in Minnesota and ½ of those would consider coming to church if a friend invited them. There are 27,000 in Winona so based on that, there are 6,000 unchurched Winonans and they would come to church if invited by a friend.

The thought of inviting a friend or neighbor to church can be daunting so here are some tips.

Tips:

1. **DEPEND ON GOD** Appeal to God's promise that He will soften hearts to the gospel (Ezekiel 11:19) and ask God to open a door for opportunities to come with those you know. (Colossians 4:3)
2. **BE A GOOD FRIEND** Unbelieving friends have a lot to offer us, as they are a good gift from God. God calls us to love our neighbors, even if we do not always get to share the gospel. It is vital that we are a good friend first before extending an invitation to church.
3. **CROSS POLLINATE** God has richly blessed us with church family to partner with us as we share the gospel. Seek out ways to introduce those you invite to others at church. For example, try a new restaurant together or take your kids on a play date. By connecting your unchurched friends to those inside the church, or cross pollinating, when your invited friends come to church they will see a sea of familiar faces and feel more at home.
4. **TALK ABOUT CHURCH** Many of our friends have skewed ideas about church or just have no idea of what going to church entails. The more we talk about church; the more we help demystify church and break down misconceptions. Help those you know see that church is about getting to know God and his people, not rules and tradition. Talk about the benefits of belonging to a church and share about the exciting ministries you are a part of.
5. **SIMPLY INVITE** Questions such as, 'Hey, what are you doing Sunday morning, want to come along to church with me?' or "There is a men's meet night coming up at my church, want to come along?" are all it takes to extend an invitation to church. If they say no, do not become discouraged, as it may take multiple invites before they come. Continue to be their friend and wait for other opportunities to arise. When the timing is right, ask them again.

Utilizing these tips are just a few of the ways to extend that important invitation to church. Additionally, be sure to be welcoming when others bring their unchurched friends, a smile and warm hug go a long way.

Creation Museum and Ark Encounter, August 5-9, 2019



Lenten Supper at 5:30pm followed by Lenten Vespers at 6:30pm.



- ◆ We will hosted our annual book walk on Saturday, March 30th.
- ◆ We miss Pastor Kevin, but are very thankful Bill Flesch has offered his time to come visit our preschool and deliver a message weekly.
- ◆ We are continuing to meet to further develop our outdoor nature space and hope to have a final vision for the space by the end of March. We continue to thank you for your support and prayers as we proceed with this project.
- ◆ This winter has given us more snow than we know what to do with, but the kids have really enjoyed their time climbing on the snow hill at the end of the parking lot. They have been really creative with what to do by making slides and snow forts all across the hill.
- ◆ We are patiently waiting for Spring to take on new adventures.



Being Salt, Being Light

In his Sermon on the Mount Jesus calls us his disciples salt, and he calls us light. These two word pictures of salt and light show us that our uniqueness is meant to make a difference in the world. It's one thing to be different. It's another to make a difference.

If we Christians are “the salt of the earth,” then the earth must need some preserving or it will go bad. If we are “the light of the world,” then the world must be a dark place in need of light. Salt and light, this is who we are!

Underneath these two word pictures is a deep love and concern for the world. We are here for the world just as Jesus was here for the world. In the familiar words of John 3:16: *“For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son.”*

The critical question this forces us to ask is: How are we doing as a faith community in being the salt and the light in our sphere of influence? How are we doing in connecting with people outside this congregation communicating God's mercy and love for them?

Sunday March 17, the adult Bible study started the conversation. Pastor Don Stein, who formerly served Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church, Onalaska, Wisconsin, and recently retired, joined the conversation. In accessing where we are currently, the group started with what are we doing to reach out to the community? The responses were many: hosting child-care Parents' Night Out; Preschool education for children regardless of race or creed; availability of garden spaces on church property to anyone interested; sponsoring People of Faith for persons with disabilities; the annual Holiday Bake Sale; being a sponsor of Hope Lutheran High School; hosting a week Vacation Bible School in August for any child preschool through fifth grade; giving support to parents by having speakers like Katy Smith; Coffee Connections where members of Redeemer visit with Preschool parents over a cup of coffee; the Preschool's annual Book Walk; our church's presence on Facebook; participating in the Halloween Trunk and Treat community event; food donations and funds for Winona Volunteer Services, Developmental Achievement Center, Every Child's Dream, the Warming Shelter, Hope Harbor, and support given to Camp Omega's building project; caroling during Advent to shut-ins and nursing homes. The list is impressive!

Years ago, when Mahatma Gandhi was the spiritual leader of India, he was asked by some Christian missionaries, “What is the greatest hindrance to Christianity in India?” Gandhi's reply was, “The Christians!” The same is true today. Many people outside the church view and experience Christians as being judgmental. Pastor Stein reminded us, one sin is not greater than another. Rather than condemn we need to offer mercy and love. We Christians should apply the law to ourselves and gospel to others.

The conversation continues Sunday March 24, focusing on what we can do to better be who we are, salt and light in our arena of the kingdom of God? Join the conversation. Easter Sunday


9am Sunday, April 21

- The Call committee will be submitting the information needed by the district in order for them to provide a call list. Continue to pray for patience. Pray that the committee would wait upon God's timing.
- Lenten Contributions will be equally directed to Volunteer Services and to the ministry of Rev Ryan McDermott and Emily. They serve the Lord through The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) as career missionaries in West and Central Africa, based in Togo, working in deaf ministry.
- Fellowship is planning an Easter Brunch. Plus the last Wednesday Service will be pizza from \$5 Pizza.
